





#### WHY REVISE?

- It's your reflection process
- Fill holes in your argument
- Improve clarity
- Organization and logical flow



#### THE FYS PORTFOLIO

WHY IS REVISING IS REALLY IMPORTANT FOR THE FYS PORTFOLIO?

#### **PRESENT 3 ESSAYS**

- → You'll be presenting three (hopefully revised) copies of your papers
- Clear thesis statements and topic sentences
- → Are you saying what you want to say?
- → How will outside readers understand your argument?

# REFLECT ON YOUR WRITING PROCESS

- → Revising helps you prepare for the Reflective Introduction Essay
- → What is your writing process and what have you learned?
- → When you're revising, reflect!



- "Higher order concerns"


# QUESTIONS TO ASK WHILE REVISING

- 1. Does my paper answer the prompt?
- 2. Do I stay on track/stick to my topic?
- 3. Do I agree with my thesis?
- **4.** Why did I arrange my paragraphs in this order?
- **5.** Do my topic sentences make an argument that relate to the thesis?
- **6.** Is there a balance between evidence and analysis?





#### APPROACHING REVISION



#### **FRAMEWORK**

Argument and significance

#### **STRUCTURE**

Organization between and within paragraphs (i.e. topic sentences, evidence, and analysis)

#### **EDITING**

Grammar and mechanics, personal voice

#### REVERSE OUTLINING



#### PARAGRAPH IDEAS

List the main ideas of your essay, paragraph by paragraph. (i.e. "P.1 discusses...")



## DIAGRAM PARAGRAPHS

Write down what is happening in your paragraphs (if you have a color coded essay, this is much easier)



# EVALUATE AND REFLECT

Do you need to reorganize? How does seeing your paper in parts affect your thesis?

#### FOR YOUR FINAL PAPER



#### REVISE

Read through your paper, look through Prof.
Buckmire's comments and add your own.
Where can you improve your structure, organization, and argumentation?

#### **EXPAND**

Where can you expand?
Are there new
examples/concepts
that you can
incorporate to
strengthen your
argument?

#### **POLISH**

Give yourself time to revise and polish, especially because this is a longer paper. Are your thesis and topic claims continuously reinforced throughout your paper?
