b. [6 points] Use MATLAB 's linefit function or some other calculations to find q and c_2 . (Show all your calculations, such as MATLAB commands and what output it produces.)

c. [2 points] What is the least square error between the experimental data and the curve of best fit? That is evaluate $E = \sum_{k=0}^{n} (y_k - P(x_k))^2$
